Education

- Developed concept paper to launch pre-school curriculum programs for autistic children in Iran.
- Held scientific and community workshop in California on autism with a Middle East focus.






CONVENING THE INTERNATIONAL AUTISM CONFERENCE IN IRAN

In 2018, SENSES CULTURAL held the International Autism Conference in Tehran, Iran. The conference was part of our program's mission to promote the science and treatment of autism in Iran.

Early in May, SENSES CULTURAL

co-hosted an autism workshop at Shiraz University, after signing a Memorandum of Understanding with the university. The workshop aimed to help families who have children with autism, and provide a space for experts in the field to meet and collaborate.



SENSES CULTURAL co-hosted two Living with Autism workshops in an autism school in Tehran in May. The workshops were held in collaboration with our sister organization Shokraneh Mavaddat Jahani, a civil organization group in Iran promoting the well-being of mothers, families and children with special needs. The two workshops





brought together the community with experts including Dr. Ismaili, Ms. Sharifi, and Mr. Ansari, who spoke on sensory stimulation and therapy, behavioral reform, and motivation for people with autism. In the second workshop, students and educators met with Shiraz University professor Dr. Nami, and Ms. Zakaria who spoke on sleep problems and art therapy for people living with autism.

On August 1, 2018, SENSES CULTURAL convened an event on to raise awareness on autism at the UC Davis Mind Institute for 50 parents and professionals from the Middle Eastern community of Sacramento, California.

In December, SENSES CULTURAL organized a workshop and presentation by Dr. Forghani on the issue of autism and the stigma associated with the diagnosis in some Middle Eastern cultures at the West Sacramento Washington School District. A clinical psychologist at Kaiser Permanente in the Autism Spectrum Disorder Center at Rancho Cordova, Dr. Forghani spoke about general outpatient therapy and early intervention in helping families cope with autism. The presentation included a detailed description of what stigma means for autistic individuals, and the differences between collectivist (Middle Eastern) and individualistic (American) cultural approaches to treating trauma in autistic communities.



SPOTLIGHT ON RESEARCH & FUNDRAISING

SPONSORING RESEARCH TO ADVANCE THE SCIENCE OF AUTISM AND NEURODEVELOPMENTAL DISORDERS

In May 2018, SENSES CULTURAL signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the UC Davis MIND Institute, a research center committed to the awareness, understanding, prevention, care, and cures of neurodevelopmental disorders such as autism. The MoU is for the purposes of:

- 1. Exchange of academic faculty
- 2. Exchange of students
- Exchange of information and knowledge including articles within academic publications
- Joint or cooperative organization of educational, scientific and cultural events

SENSES CULTURAL and the Department of Neuroscience at Shiraz University in Iran co-hosted their first autism research training event in early May 2018, after signing a Memorandum of Understanding. The event was held at the DANA Brain Health Institute, affiliated with Shiraz University. Over 50 parents with autistic children attended the



workshop to share experiences and gain practical advice on managing challenges. Speakers included our Advisory Board members Dr. Nami and Dr. Forghani.

SENSES CULTURAL raises community funds during Thanksgiving, Christmas and on World Autism Day each year, by bringing experts and professors from major universities to provide insights into the latest research and treatment of autism. This Thanksgiving, we were blessed to have Dr. Randi Hagerman, a lead researcher at the UC Davis MIND Institute, deliver our message to our community.

In October, SENSES CULTURAL held a fundraising event to support an upcoming International Autism Conference in Tehran. The conference is part of a journey we started years ago with great promise. From Sacramento to Tehran, and soon to other cities in Iran and the Middle East, SENSES CULTURAL is committed to helping those impacted by autism and related neurodevelopmental disorders, so they can live better lives.



SPOTLIGHT ON AUTISM BEYOND BORDERS

SENSES CULTURAL is the recipient of the U.S. Department of Treasury's sanctions exemptions license, which enables the organization to lead humanitarian projects in U.S. sanctioned countries including Iran.

SENSES CULTURAL builds on years of experience promoting the science, research and treatment of autism in Iran, and working collaboratively with Iranian experts in the field to develop culturally nuanced treatments.

To this end, SENSES CULTURAL successfully reached out to the Health and Treatment Commission of the Islamic Consultative Assembly and the Secretary General of the Majma Kheireen Salamat Keshvar (The Society of Charities for Country Health) to launch a collaborative project to develop a nationwide preschool program and curriculum for children with autism in Iran.

SENSES CULTURAL HOLDS WORKSHOP ON AUTISM WITH A MIDDLE EASTERN FOCUS

SENSES CULTURAL Family and Patient Advocacy Advisor Robert Miller moderated a workshop on Autism with a Middle Eastern Focus this year. Mr. Miller tied his experience with the organization to his travels to the Middle East on behalf of SENSES CULTURAL, to discuss our work filling an important gap to make sure that families from a Middle Eastern background, whether they live in the region or in the US, have access to all the knowledge and services available to serve children with special needs including autism and other neurodevelopmental disorders.

The workshop brought together four prominent speakers from UC Davis and The Mind Institute, and the Sacramento health community, to offer evidencebased practice and research in the area. Themes covered in the workshop included migration-related trauma for autistic children, disability rights advocacy in California for migrant communities, Middle Eastern cultural barriers to treating autism, and the causes of autism.

We proudly support the climate strikers and its leader Greta Thunberg who courageously turned the gift of being autistic into building a worldwide movement against environmental degradation.





CELEBRATING WORLD AUTISM DAY AND PROMOTING ART FOR AUTISM

SENSES CULTURAL celebrates World Autism Day each year in April, with a series of luncheons, community workshops, and fund-raising programs. This year, SENSES CULTURAL organized community lunches with Middle Eastern themes, and promoted art that demonstrates the intersections of culture and autism in different communities.

In 2018, SENSES CULTURAL founder Tata Monfared spoke at the Living with Autism event held on the sidelines of Art for Autism exhibition held at





Niavaran Institution of Art & Cultural Foundation in Tehran. In her talk, Tata raised awareness about the importance of arts and culture for families living with autism and other neurodevelopmental disorders, and enlisted the pro bono services and support of many local artists and actors who volunteered to support our mission.
