

SENSES CULTURAL joined forces with the International House of Davis to offer a very special FREE film festival in October, showing short films made by 16-year-olds in Mozambique (Home is Where You Find It) and India (Fire in Our Hearts). This was a wonderful opportunity for Davis and Yolo County in California to see a unique and creative way for young adults to be empowered. The film project is the work of Holly Carter, a New York-based journalist, filmmaker and founder of the nonprofit BYkids, which pairs with filmmakers from developing countries to produce kid-centered documentaries about their lives.














Traveled to London, Uk, to Promote Bykids
















An Evening With Holly Carter and the Small Media Company
